PRESCRIPTOR

A critical examination of the types of evidence that may be accepted by a court; the persons who may or must give evidence; the manner in which evidence is presented; and the amount of evidence required to prove a proposition of fact. Involves a significant research component on a selected aspect of the law.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

1. Explain and examine the common law trial procedure and its purpose of “fact-finding” for the purpose of achieving “truth” and/or “justice”.
2. Critically analyse how the common law trial procedure of fact-finding differs from that of European inquisitorial systems and under tikanga Māori.
3. Apply the rules governing the admissibility of evidence and the exclusion of evidence.
4. Apply the Evidence Act 2006.
5. Discuss how the law of evidence applies in legal practice and the common issues practitioners deal with at trial and on appeal.
6. Demonstrate advanced capabilities in analysis of legal problems.
